



New Foundation Initiatives

The Eliminate Project

The Kiwanis Foundation of Canada, in their effort to be a positive part of the KI/UNICEF Eliminate Project, have agreed to put into place a fundraising program that will initiate a one million dollar benefit to the Eliminate program. The Foundation Board has set aside in a restricted account the sum of \$250,000 and has announced a matching program with the Kiwanis clubs of Canada that for every \$3.00 they provide in donations for Eliminate, the Foundation will add \$1.00 until the amount of \$250,000 has been reached and by so doing will raise \$1,000,000 toward the Eliminate program goal for Canada.

New Member Incentives

The KFC Board wants to encourage all Kiwanis members in Canada to help Kiwanis grow and therefore has established a new member incentive program. First prize is a trip to the 2013 Kiwanis International Convention for the member sponsor and the new member. Prize includes 2 tickets, return airfare and transfers from the nearest Canadian Gateway Airport, plus convention registration and five nights accommodation (1 room each) at your International District Hotel in Vancouver, BC.

Second prize is a trip to the 2013 Kiwanis District convention for the member sponsor and the new member. It includes convention registration, return transportation and four nights accommodation (1 room each) at your district convention hotel. An Early Bird draw will take place on April 10, 2012 (then the ticket will be returned to the draw). The draw is for the sponsor and the new member registration and two nights accommodation (1 room each) to their 2012 district convention. Winners will be notified by telephone.

Get out and sponsor your new members, then forward your application to the Foundation Office. All clubs should have application forms or ask your Lt. Governor.

Western Canada Key Leader - 2011

On the weekend of September 30 – October 2, 2011, two very successful Key Leader Camps were held in Western Canada, with nearly 100 students, grades 9 to 12 participating.



One camp was held at Camp Arnes, near Gimli, Manitoba, while the other was at Birch Bay Ranch near Edmonton, Alberta. Each camp was led by a professional facilitator provided by Kiwanis International, while a staff member from Indianapolis assisted at each camp. Students were divided into neighbourhoods, each of which was led by a student facilitator, providing those students an excellent opportunity to practice their leadership skills. In addition, adult chaperones were present to help out and monitor students in their off time.

The camps started right after supper on Friday (with all participants being extremely well fed all weekend), continuing until nearly midnight. Saturday was a full day, with sessions in the morning and after supper. The afternoon was taken up by outdoor teambuilding



exercises and challenge courses for the students. At Birch Bay, we were fortunate to have a Cree Elder present from one of the schools, who led two spirit circles, not just for the First Nation students in attendance, but for all the participants, students and adults. Sunday morning was another series of sessions and the camps finished at 11:30 am.

The cost of operating Canadian Key Leader Camps is generously supported by the Kiwanis Foundation of Canada, which provided a \$50 scholarship per student, reducing the registration fee to \$155 from \$205. For any participant who was an active member of a Key Club, the registration cost was again reduced by a further \$25 through a subsidy from the Kiwanis International Foundation.
